





Flora and Fauna

There are many rare and threatened plant species to be found on Aran, such as Pyramidal Bugle (Ajuga pyramidalis), Wood Small-reed (Calamagrostis epigejos), Blue Moor-grass (Sesleria albicans) and Burnet Rose (Rosa pimpinellifolia) to name just a few - so be careful where you put those feet! Much of the flora and birdlife of Aran is of international significance, and is protected under European wildlife legislation. Bird species which breed on the Island include Chough, Little Tern, Arctic Tern, Sandwich Tern and Peregrine Falcon.

The fascinating seal colony in Aran is also worth a visit.

ACCESS ÁRAINN

Travel to Árainn by ferry boat from Ros A Mhíl (Rossaveal) in Connemara or Doolin in Co. Clare or by air from Indreabhán (Inverin).

As you arrive by ferry to Cill Rónán, you will be met by a bustling, vibrant harbour with tour buses, pony-and-trap and bicycle hire vendors in the harbour area. Many visitors don't expect to be met by such an array of activity, but take this as a sign of a vibrant, living community. Beyond the

harbour are areas of seclusion and peace. If pedalling is your pleasure, hire a bike in Kilronan village and explore at will around this lovely island or take a pony and trap, or a guided tour with a modern minibus, from the pier. Alternatively, see Aran by foot, and walk along the pathways of

history on this unique island. Swim in unpolluted seas, study rare flowers and wildlife, write, paint, take pictures, fish or just relax, unwind and learn spoken Irish in this bilingual community. And when the Celtic twilight comes, drop in for a quiet pint, or enjoy a wealth of Irish music.

Aran cannot be appreciated or seen fully in just a day trip, so Come, Stay & Explore our wonderful Island.

A BAILE CILL RÓNÁIN Kilronan Village

As you arrive into Cill Rónán harbour, you will see the main village on the island of Inis Mór nestled against the limestone backdrop. This village is made up of a mixture of Georgian type buildings dating back to English colonialism, to traditional and modern homes. The village provides many facilities from accommodation (hotel, hostel, guesthouses and B&Bs), Fáilte Ireland tourist information office, restaurants, cafes, coffee shops, craft shops, pubs (which also serve food) and the Spar supermarket, where one can avail of the ATM machine if required.

The majority of transport providers begin their tours from the harbour area or equally you can spend some time enjoying the village and then pick up a tour (bus, pony-and-trap or bicycle) to visit the rest of the island.

An excellent park and playground is located in Cill Rónán village and is a must for all families.

B CILL MHUIRBHÍGH Kilmurvey Village

Cill Muirbhígh is located at the base of the famous Dún Aonghasa fort. Cill Muirbhígh village is a pretty yet bustling little village. It has a beautiful blue flag beach, one of Ireland's finest. The village has Craft & Coffee shops, including the traditional Nan Phaidí Café (see over for picture and details) famous for its home baking and cooking.

C TEAGHLACH ÉINNE The Church of Saint Enda

Located in the graveyard in Cill Éinne. This is the church of Saint Enda, who is credited with being the founder of monasticism in Ireland in to 5th century AD. The church shows development over a very long period. The east and north walls, as far as the doorway, belong to an early church while the rest is of late, or post medieval. Some cross slabs, part of a late 11th century high cross and some inscribed stones are on the site.

D TEAMPALL BHEANÁIN The Church of Saint Bheanán

Prominently located in Cill Éinne, on the skyline, Teampall Bheanáin is a tiny church notable for its orientation - North/South instead of the usual East/West. This is an early mortared stone church, dating from the 10th century.



E DÚN DÚCHATHAIR Black Fort

Dún Dúchathair (Black Fort) on the cliffs south of Cill Rónán is a large stone promontory fort with "chevaux de frise" - bands of stone, standing on edge and ruined clocháns.




F POLL NA BPÉIST Serpent's Lair

This is located near the village of Gort na gCapall, down below the cliffs near the edge of the water. It is a rectangular shaped pool, connected to the ocean by an underwater channel. It is an unusual site and well worth a visit. This site has gained fame due to "Red Bull Cliff Diving" holding two competitions here.

G DÚN AONGHASA

Dún Aonghasa is a dramatic stone fort standing defiantly on a cliff-top almost 300 feet above sea level. The oldest of the islands stone forts, it consists of 4 sets of dry stone walls and a defensive feature known as a "chevaux de frise" - bands of stone, standing on edge. Access to the fort is via the OPW Visitor Centre at the base of the fort. Adults €4, Seniors €3, Child €2, Family €10. Free on the first Wednesday of the month.

OTHER POINTS OF INTEREST

Teampall Chiaráin

Dedicated to St. Ciarán, who founded Cláin Macnoise and who spent some of his early life in Árainn, it is built on the site of an earlier church and has architectural features from different periods.



Portdeha

This area is on the Eastern side of the island, just where the road ends. A lovely green quiet area very suitable for families with young children, open green fields where hundreds of rabbits roam free.

Arkin Fort/Caisleán Aircín

Aircín Fort is located in Cill Éinne, just before Cill Éinne Pier. Last rebuilt in 1652 it is the remains of a star-shaped military fort.

J CLOCHÁN NA CARRAIGE beehive hut


A clochán is a stone-roofed house. This is a fine example. It is roofed in corbelled fashion. Although on the outside it looks round, internally it is almost rectangular. It has two opposing doorways.



THE ÁRAINN VISITOR CODE

- Keep Aran litter free, please dispose of your rubbish in litter and recycling bins
- Please do not climb or remove any part of ancient or sacred sites on Aran
- Cycle safely in single file and keep to the left at all times
- Avoid picking flowers, some are very rare and protected by law
- Be sensitive to the host community and observe people's privacy
- Please do not build replica dolmens or standing stone on the island
- Please stay on roads and trails and avoid knocking dry stone walls
- Campers, please use campsites
- Please do not light fires on farmland
- Beware of the danger & power of the sea - Never turn your back on the sea while exploring the Island!
